


"A chair is still a chair, even when there's no one sitting there, but a chair is not a house and a house is not a home when there's no one there to hold you tight, and no one there you can kiss good night." These lyrics from Burt Bacharach ring true. A piece of furniture does not make a home, it's the people in the house which makes it a home. For the people of Stanislaus County, their homes are hopefully full of people and love, but may contain a piece of furniture from one loving family, who for over seventy years have been supplying them with furniture, the Woods Family of Turlock.

This is a special edition of the McHenry Museum & Historical Society Newsletter, as we sat down with not one member of a family to tell the story of a historic business, but multiple members to not only share the history of their store, but the strong bond of a family who kept it running. Thurman (1910-2005) and Elsa (1909-1997) Woods opened a furniture and appliance store in Downtown Turlock in the early 1950s. Their children to their grandchildren, and now greatgrandchildren keep their legacy alive.





Thurman and Elsa Woods had three children Darryl, Carrolyn, and Sally. Darryl's widow Gloria, and her three sons David, Gary, and Randy, as well as Carrolyn Woods Nicholas, and Sally Woods Ocken, all assisted in telling the story of Woods Furniture, and the Woods Family. Thurman Woods' story begins in Grants Pass Oregon on November 1, 1910. He was the only son of Grover Woods (1886-1933) and Myrtle Crawford Woods (1889-1959). In Carrolyn Woods Nicholas' words, "the family was nomadic." Grover Woods never recovered from the 1918 Flu Pandemic and would ultimately pass pre-maturely. The Woods family found themselves in Tempe, Arizona, San Dimas, California, and settled in Atwater, California. Thurman's Grandmother purchased a small store, where the family ended up living on Lander Avenue in Turlock. Thurman graduated Turlock High School, attended Modesto Junior College, and eventually earned a degree from the University of California, Berkeley. He returned to Turlock and ran a Union 76 Oil Gas Station. He later ran a used car lot, and a Packard Agency. All the while, he was buying property in Turlock. Thurman decided to build a building on a lot he owned at 433 East Main Street and Palm Street. This 3,000 square-foot store was built with no idea what to do with it.

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
Darryl Woods graduated University of California, Berkeley with a degree in history in 1958. It was at a dental appointment upon returning to Turlock where a new generation for this furniture store family began. At one visit to Dr. Gordon Bonander (1923-2017) in Turlock, Darryl met dental assistant Gloria Gimle, a Hilmar Native and niece of long-time Turlock Mayor Enoch Christoffersen (1903-1990). Enamored by the perky blonde, Darryl returned home and told his mother Elsa, who called Dr. Bonander's wife Mary Lou (1930-2018) to ask if Gloria was single. She was! Darryl returned to the dental office and informed Gloria he had been away and did not know what to do for fun in Turlock. She suggested to him the movie theater and the bowling alley are fun. He invited her bowling and she accepted. Gloria beat him in their first game. They became engaged a few months later and married on December 26, 1959. Together they had three sons: David "Dave" in 1962, Gary in 1964, and Randall "Randy" in 1967. The Woods family has always valued their employees and did their best to create a family of workers. Darryl joined his father in the family business primarily due to embracing the idea of meeting people and helping customers create their perfect home.

Where Thurman could be direct and matter of fact, he spoke the truth, always. He could literally place random furniture in the showroom and sell it. Darryl was more like his mother, and much calmer. When Thurman, Elsa, Gloria, and Darryl attended furniture shows, Darryl became interested in the design of a furniture gallery, especially those by Flexsteel Brand. Less furniture and more of a focus on how a room could look doubled Woods' business. As sales expanded, there was more work to do as the Woods boys grew up. They were frequently called by their father and grandfather to contribute to the store. The Woods boys were all athletes, and Gary Woods remembers how the phone would ring every Saturday morning with store tasks from Darryl. Even if it meant washing windows or unloading rail spurs, the entire family contributed. Thurman pushed his family to always do



Thurman knew he had a family well-abled to take the reins of the organization and retired in 1981. Under Darryl's leadership Woods Furniture opened a second location at Five East Main Street in 1990, which had a long history in Turlock as a hardware store. At the time, the store was owned by the Mensinger Family of American Lumber in Modesto. They also expanded to a warehouse on Linwood Avenue that same decade. The 1990s saw great expansion for the company as well as the biggest loss.


Though paralyzed on her left side due to a stroke in 1981, Elsa Woods remained independent and determined. On November 1, 1997, Thurman's eighty-seventh birthday, Elsa ventured on her Lark Scooter to the market to get supplies to make a pie for her husband. On returning home she was struck by a vehicle. She died eleven days later, on November 12, 1997. She was eighty-eight years old. Elsa Woods was the glue of her family. If Thurman was rough, Elsa came along to smooth any situation. Her death brought devastation, but new life as well. Six weeks later, Gary Woods had a daughter he named Elsa. Thurman Woods always believed in education. Daughter Carrolyn excelled as an English Teacher at Grace Davis High School in Modesto. She ran then ran special education for Modesto City Schools. She then moved to a position Assistant Principal at Wakefield Elementary in Turlock and was later Superintendent of Hughson Elementary School District. Gary Woods received his bachelor's degree from the University of California, Davis, his master's from California State University, Stanislaus, and was looking for ways to complete his Doctorate in Education from the University of the Pacific. Following Elsa Woods' death, Thurman presented Gary with the funds to seek his doctorate. Then in his nineties, Thurman was there to watch his grandson receive the highest degree in his family. Gary went on to retire as Superintendent of Schools for the Beverly Hills Unified School District, in Beverly Hills, California, thus adding a 90210 to a 95380 family.





Though always interested in the store and his family, Thurman Woods spent the remainder of his life in the home he shared with his beloved Elsa. He passed away at age ninety-five on October 22, 2005. Darryl, and sons Dave and Randy, continued to run the store. Gloria could be seen in one of the showrooms on a regular basis. When Darryl began to consider retirement, He once again passed the reigns to the next generation. He encouraged his sons to open a new location by Highway 99. Dave and Randy listened, and they purchased a location at the Taylor Road Exit in the mid-2000s. The plan was to phase out the Main Street locations one at a time. When the recession hit, it was Darryl who told his sons to sell the two downtown stores and focus on their freeway location. They listened. Woods Furniture would be at that location when Darryl Woods passed away after a long illness on May 28, 2018.

The Global Pandemic brought an end to the Freeway location, and Dave Woods officially retired in 2020. Randy looked toward a new incarnation for the store. In 2021, Woods Furniture re-opened at 225 Lander Avenue in Turlock. Though one could write a story on furniture and brands, this is really the story of a family, a family who continues five generations deep. Dave and wife, Elizabeth, have four children, daughters Drew and Darcy, and sons Derek and Davis, and seven grandchildren, with their eighth due in late August 2022. Gary and wife, Blanca, have daughters Elsa and Doris, and sons Darryl "Seve" and Ole. Randy and wife, Shara, have daughter Annistyn and son Ridge. Carrolyn Woods Nicholas, and her husband Jim, and Sally Woods Ocken and her husband Bruce, have left Turlock for the state of Nevada. Carrolyn is blessed with two stepchildren, Shelli and Kirk Nicholas, six grandchildren, and one great-grandchild. Sally and Bruce have two daughters Andi and Jeni and two grandchildren. The family was raised close and connected, thanks to the lessons of Thurman and Elsa. They were taught the value of money through hard work and determination. They valued their employees and went above and beyond to accommodate their customers. The Woods Family have been involved in more business, civic, and charitable endeavors than one article can list. For a family who started as nomads looking for one place to settle, they sure have made a home in Stanislaus County. Woods Furniture and the Woods Family have assisted countless other families in making their houses homes. As Gary Woods told us, The Woods family are simply people who worked longer and harder than anyone and passed it on.
